

Why Create A Relationship With Your Veterinarian

It is 11:00 at night and your finest cow is down and straining, it has been 4 hours since her labor began, and your concern is growing as there is no progress. This is a true emergency. You feel comfortable enough to clean her up and reach in, however, you do not feel the normal 2 feet and nose. Who do you call? This is where a relationship with a veterinarian pays off, otherwise it may be difficult to coax a veterinarian out to your farm if they have never been to your operation.

This is an obvious advantage of having a relationship with a veterinarian. But there are many more advantages of having a continuing relationship with a veterinarian. They become part of your animal management team to maintain/improve your cattle health, productivity which improves your bottom line no matter the size of your herd.

Here are some advantages of that relationship:

- Identifying preventative measures to improve herd health such as vaccinations what to use and when to use them for your particular herd. Preventative measures can save a lot of money in reduced drug costs, better animal health and growth.
- Advice on proper drug choice and drug use. For example, is that bottle of Penicillin from the feed store effective against pneumonia? (The answer NO) Using the wrong drug or incorrect dosage and how it is administered can lead to poor outcomes, increased chance of drug residues, and increased antibiotic resistance. A veterinarian can help with recommendations on what drugs are most effective for properly diagnosed issues in your animals.
- Advice on facilities, cow comfort, nutrition, lameness, welfare, etc.
- Advice on biosecurity, risks that your farm may have for diseases to enter and/or spread on your farm.

Knowing what diseases to be looking for and how to control them if you find them is important to prevent diseases such as Johne's or BVD from becoming a major financial drain on your operation. What to look for in a herd veterinarian? The "fire-engine" veterinarian that only does sick cow and emergency work is disappearing. More veterinarians are focusing on consultation, routine pregnancy/health checks and overall farm management and records review in addition to the sick animal and emergency calls. Looking for a veterinarian who can help you with the "big picture" will offer you more resources and guarantee you will have someone to call when needed. Most veterinarians will want to visit your farm and walk through your facilities and discuss your management and concerns to validate the relationship. This meeting should take place at least annually so the veterinarian can remain knowledgeable about your operation.

Assistance for farms to help establish and maintain a veterinary relationship can be found through the New York State Cattle Health Assurance Program (NYSCHAP). This program is a voluntary cattle management program for disease and herd management. The program will help defray costs of a farm meeting with their herd veterinarian on an annual basis. This will also allow a review of potential risks for disease, discuss health concerns, and create a plan for moving the farm forward to improve herd health and productivity. 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It's Time to Update your BQA Certification

All BQA Certified Producers need to re-certify every three years. Re-certification provides the opportunity for producers to review BQA practices on their farm and continue to increase their knowledge to provide a safe, wholesome product that is raised responsibly. Meetings that qualify must include a presentation relating to one of the BQA key principles and may be hosted by your veterinarian clinic, pharmaceutical rep, or local extension office. If you are questioning if a meeting will serve as recertification please feel free to contact one of us.

Re-certification Easy as 1-2-3!!!

Here are the 3 steps required to complete BQA Re-certification:

Step 1: Complete one of the following options for Continuing Education credit:

Individual consultation with your veterinarian covering antibiotic use, drug residues, injections, herd health plan, or other topic at discretion of your herd veterinarian. Veterinarian must fill out information on bottom of the VCPR form and sign. NYSCHAP participants: Yearly review with state and local veterinarian is acceptable.

Attend an educational meeting (45 minutes or more) on a topic related to care and husbandry, feedstuffs, feed additives and medications, processing and treatment records and/or injectable health products.

Online Re-Certification Go to www.nybeef.org. Visit the "Farmers Fence Post" where you will find the Beef Quality Assurance page, scroll down to find more information about Re-Certification. There you can complete the online re-certification option.

Document your completed Continued Education on the BQA Re-Certification form.

Step 2: Review and sign the BQA Contract on the BQA Re-Certification form.

Step 3: If you are pursuing NYS Level II certification, have your Veterinarian complete the VCPR portion of the BQA Re-Certification form.

Return the completed Re-Certification Form to the NYBC office, 6351 NYS Route 26 South Rome, NY 13440. After all forms are received your record will be updated, be sure to include an email for certification download and future updates.

Three Keys to Quality Colostrum for Beef Calves

Unlike many other mammals, when calves are born, they enter the world lacking any immunity to disease. To build up the defenses they need, calves are wholly dependent on colostrum from their mothers. And the instant a calf is born, a clock begins ticking on its colostrum intake that can have lasting effects on its health and productivity, says Peggy Thompson, DVM, Boehringer Ingelheim.

"Receiving adequate colostrum during those first 24 hours will have a lifelong impact on a calf in terms of its ability to fend off disease, put on weight, and in the case of heifers, calve early," Dr. Thompson said. "And when it comes to transferring maternal antibodies from the cow to the calf, 24 hours is even too late."

Dr. Thompson stresses that producers should do their best to ensure calves are up and nursing within two hours of being born.

"After just six hours, a calf's gut begins to change, making it more difficult to absorb the immunity-boosting antibodies found in colostrum," she said. "As we've learned more about colostrum over the years, the general practice has gone from making sure calves are nursing within the first 24 hours, to 12, to six and now the recommendation is two hours."

In addition to antibodies, however, calves also receive critical vitamins, minerals and fats from their mothers' colostrum, so colostrum quality is another factor to consider and one that producers can impact positively.

Three keys to quality colostrum

"Nutrition is huge," said Dr. Thompson. "If a cow is in poor body condition, then her body is going to use any nutrition for itself before making colostrum."

Dr. Thompson recommends working with a nutritionist to be sure pregnant cows are getting what they need in their diets heading into calving.

Vaccinating, or giving a booster vaccine to cows prior to calving, is another way to ensure plenty of antibodies make their way into colostrum. Dr. Thompson recommends administering vaccines about five months prior to calving as part of a fall pregnancy check with a veterinarian, but no later than two months prior, to ensure there's adequate time for the antibodies to be passed into the colostrum. Killed vaccines are especially efficient at encouraging antibody production prior to calving, Dr. Thompson said.

Calving in a relatively warm and clean environment can also have an impact on a calf's ability to fend off diseases early on.

"If you're calving into a muddy mess, then it doesn't matter how many antibodies that calf gets from its mom," Dr. Thompson said. "The infectious agents in that mud can overcome a calf's immunity. Nothing replaces good management practices."

Another benefit of conducting a pregnancy check in the fall is that veterinarians can give producers a more accurate idea of when a cow will give birth, which can allow producers to be ready to monitor colostrum intake and step in if problems arise.

Warning signs

If calves begin showing signs of scours or pneumonia anywhere from 24 hours to 3 weeks of age, it could signal they're not receiving adequate colostrum—both from a quality and quantity standpoint.

When this occurs, the best thing producers can do to verify that the problem is indeed with the calf's immunity is to work with their veterinarian to do a blood test, ideally in the first few days of a calf's life. This way, if there is a problem there's still time to address it. If several weeks or a month have gone by, it makes it more difficult to pinpoint the real issue.

Traditionally, blood tests in cases like these have measured a serum protein that can sometimes give false positives or show that a calf has adequate immunity when in reality it does not. More recently, veterinarians have begun measuring the actual antibodies calves receive from their mothers, which are called immunoglobulins or IgGs. IgG tests are more expensive than traditional blood tests, but are able to provide more accurate results.

If tests determine there is a problem with a calf's immunity, producers should work with their veterinarian to determine if a packaged colostrum replacement could help, Dr. Thompson said.

With the right tools, good management practices and a watchful eye in the hours and days following calving, producers can put their calves on track for lifelong productivity by helping them get the colostrum they need.



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

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
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A VIEW FROM THE TRACTOR SEAT By Paul Trowbridge

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Feed at Night, Calve During the Day

As cattle producers begin thinking about calving season and management practices to ease the work load a bit, night feeding is something to be considered. Producers have questioned whether or not time of feeding affects time of calving, and the answer is "Yes."

Research indicates that feeding cows later in the day and evening will increase the number of calves born during daylight hours, when it is typically easier to keep a close eye on them. Gus Konefal, a rancher in Manitoba first developed this feeding method after he discovered that 80% of his cows calved between 7 a.m. and 7 p.m when they were fed later in the day. Konefal's method included a twice a day feeding, with first feeding between 11:00 a.m. and noon and second feeding between 9:30-10:00 p.m.

Similar research at Iowa State University using the Konefal feeding system, but only feeding one time per day at 4 p.m., starting 2 weeks prior to the expected start of calving, resulted in 82% of cows calving between 6 a.m. and 10 p.m. In addition, calves born between 5 a.m. and 11 p.m. (75% of the 24 hour day) was 91%. Therefore, only 9% of calves were born outside the window when traditional calf checks are performed. An important thing to note is that when heifers were separated from the data set and analyzed, 90% of the heifers also calved in this same time frame. A survey collected from 15 beef producers in Iowa and Missouri reported feeding once daily between 5 p.m. and 10 p.m. resulted in 85% of cows calving between 5 a.m. and midnight. Compare this data to cows not on the Konefel feeding system in the same herds that were calving 50/50% day and night.

Researchers at USDA-ARS at Miles City, MT completed at three-year study evaluating differences in feeding time on calving time, but the numbers were not as dramatic as Konefel and Iowa State data. However, there was a consistent 10-20% decrease in the number of cows calving between 10 p.m. to 6 a.m. in the late fed cows compared to the early fed cows.

Here are some points to remember if Konefal calving will be implemented:

Research has indicated that for this method to be most effective, it should be started one month prior to calving, but shorter duration before the start of calving will still have some effect.

Iowa State advises staying as close to the same feeding schedule and feed amount as possible each day. Deviating more than 15 minutes or providing too much feed will yield less desirable results.

Maintain regular night checks. Konefal calving may simply mean that there will be less work to be done between checks due to fewer calves born during the night.

It works best in a drylot situation where all feed is provided. Desired effect in a grazing situation may not be seen unless supplemental hay or timing of grazing can be regulated.

Weather can play a role in effectiveness. Before or during storms, cattle may not come to the bunk to eat and may be more likely to calve at night.

Additional research indicates that a first calf heifer that calves during the day will tend to calve during the day the remainder of her productive years.

This method of management may help to decrease the number of nights spent up waiting for cows and heifers to calve by helping to move more of the calving to daylight hours.

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
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


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
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



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


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
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
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
