





Regional News

Washington County launched Jr. Beef Ambassador Program

September 2021

A "Washington County Jr. Beef Ambassador" program was launched at the County Fair this August. The program was a collaboration with the NY Beef Producers Region 12, the Washington County Jr. Beef Club, NY Beef Council, and Cornell Cooperative Extension of Washington County.

Twenty-three youth from 3 counties gathered for a youth education night August 3rd, where they participated in presentations from Jean O'Toole, New York Beef Council, focusing on beef cuts and nutrition; Phil Trowbridge, Trowbridge Farms, speaking on cattle handling and the beef community; and Chrissy Claudio, Agriculture Subject Educator Madison County CCE discussing



environmental factors and animal wellbeing. The interactive sessions involved youth filling out a "talking points" card, as they traveled station to station, resulting in a complete card to take with them at the end of the night. This unique opportunity allowed youth to meet with and ask beef industry experts about their role



in the beef community. Youth left with a deeper understanding of consumer FAQs, talking points for tough questions, and how to tell their story.

Then, thanks to a generous contribution from Mack Brook Farms, youth engaged with fair goers at the Washington County Fair, Greenwich NY, handing out Muddy Trails Beef Jerky snack sticks and answering consumer questions about beef. Signs were posted throughout the open and junior beef barns, encouraging fairgoers to seek out Jr. Beef Ambassadors with any questions.

PREGNANCY CHECKS

Checking cows for pregnancy is a good management tool

Using pregnancy checks is a good management tool to aid in decision making: 1) calves can be weaned early to sell open cows at peak market prices, 2) thin cows can be sorted off to fatten before selling, or 3) open heifers can be sold when they will still bring top dollar.

Another reason to pregnancy check is to monitor the herd's health and reproductive status. Finding more open cows than usual can signal a dis-



ease problem such as infectious bovine rhinotracheitis, bovine viral diarrhea (BVD) or sexually transmitted diseases that cause cows to abort. Nutritional de-

ficiencies in a herd can also show up as open cows, especially in two-year-old's that should have bred back for their second calves. Some producers also use pregnancy testing to determine when cows will calve, facilitating sorting them into early- and late-calving groups.

According to 2007-08 National Animal Health Monitoring System data, about 20% of beef cowcalf producers use pregnancy testing or palpation in their herds. However, the benefits of this practice are simple to realize. Compare the roughly \$15/head cost of a pregnancy exam with the \$100-200/head cost of hay alone to feed an open cow through the winter, and pregnancy testing quickly pays for itself.

Producers have several options for testing, including palpation, ultrasound, and a blood test. Each method has advantages and disadvantages and what you choose may depend upon your individual operation.

Palpation – Rectal palpation is the traditional method. Indications of pregnancy can be detected as early as 35 days – and definitely by 45 days – by feeling the uterus, ovaries, and uterine arteries through the rectal wall. The position of ovaries changes as pregnancy advances; the increasing weight of the uterus pulls them deeper into the abdominal cavity. After the fifth month, the weight and size of the fetus and its fluids cause the uterus to sink down and rest on the abdominal floor. Experienced veterinarians can estimate stage of pregnancy with fair accuracy between 30 and 100 days and after seven months. The mid-stage of pregnancy is a little harder to date.

Taking the bull out after a defined breeding season helps when it comes time to pregnancy test because it eliminates those questionable ones that may have just been bred but can't be definitively determined by palpation.

Ultrasound – Ultrasound can detect pregnancy earlier than palpation, sometimes as early as 13 days after breeding (but more commonly after 21 days) but is more expensive and requires equipment and electricity. It can provide more information than palpation, such as viability of the fetus, incidence of twins, and sex (between 55 and 90 days' gestation).

The cost of ultrasound is about twice that of rectal palpation, but the improved accuracy is worth it to many producers. Ultrasound is used extensively in dairies because diagnosis of reproductive issues is more accurate. One downside to checking early (with any method) is that some cows may abort or resorb a pregnancy before calving time. A cow that checked pregnant early on may end up open or very late instead.

BQA Update

The days and the farm chore list are getting shorter, which provides more time to get BQA certified!

Remember to check the NYBPA.org or NYbeef. org calendars for in-person training dates. You can also complete Level 1 training online at bqa. org.

There are three options: Cow/Calf, Stocker/Backgrounder, or Feedyard.

Another certification program is Beef Quality Assurance Transportation. Most haulers in NY should take the Farmer/Rancher training which focuses on gooseneck trailers. Each of these modules takes 2-4 hours to complete.

For those needing recertification, this can be accomplished in three ways.

- 1. Attend an educational meeting related to animal health either in-person or online that is 45 minutes or longer.
- 2. Meet with your veterinarian for a herd consult for 30 minutes or more.
- 3. Complete the online certification (one of the modules above) or watch the recertification videos and complete the test at https://www.nybeef.org/farmers-fencepost/beef-quality-assurance-certification/bqa-recertification-online-continued-education.


Remember to complete your VCPR with your vet to maintain your Level 2 certification.

NY DIETETIC INTERNS EXPLORE SUSTAIN ABLE BEEF AT TWO FARM TOURS

Thirty dietetic interns learned how beef is sustainably raised during two separate farm-to-fork tours, at the Maple Acres Farm and SK Herefords Farms in McGraw and Medina, N.Y. Sept 3rd and 17th, respectively. The farm tours were hosted by Betsy Hicks and the Keppler family and presented by New York Beef Council (NYBC).

The attendees included dietetic interns from Syracuse University and D'Youville College. The farmers led the attendees on a tour of the farm and discussed the daily practices of caring for the cattle, the land and water. They discussed rotation grazing, how cattle improve soil health, and Beef Quality Assurance training. They explored beef sustainability and learned that cattle are unique in our food system because they upcycle inedible grass and plants into high-quality protein that families enjoy. Interns were also educated about the nutrition of beef by dietitian consultant Michelle Barber.

The attendees were very engaging and had a strong desire to know about cattle care and the environmental impact of beef production. Survey results of participants showed a



very positive shift in their view of the environmental impact of beef farming. Those who are concerned about cattle farming practices dropped from 85% to 14% after the tours. After the tours, those who would recommend beef consumption 3 to 4 times a week increased from 20% percent to 67% percent. "The experience was VERY insightful to the practices, the production, and the overall operation of where beef actually comes from. Knowing more about the cows themselves and the nutritional benefits I found all to be very insightful," wrote an attendee.

Another Battle on "Waters of the United States" (WOTUS)

In 2006, the U.S. Supreme Court tasked EPA with defining "waters of the United States" (WOTUS), to establish clear guidelines for stakeholders regulated under the Clean Water Act. In 2015, EPA and the Army Corps of Engineers finalized the WOTUS Rule, which was a significant expansion of federal jurisdiction, including isolated waterbodies and features that only carry water following precipitation. In 2020, EPA finalized a revised definition — the Navigable Waters Protection Rule (NWPR) — that more appropriately limited federal jurisdiction to waterways that significantly contribute to downstream water quality.

The NWPR, unlike the 2015 WOTUS rule, did not subject ephemeral streams or isolated water features to federal regulation. Additionally, the NWPR scaled back the wetlands subject to federal jurisdiction, which greatly simplified implementation of the rule. The rule also provided much-needed agricultural exemptions for stock ponds, prior converted cropland, and other agricultural features. NCBA engaged in litigation to defend the NWPR in federal courts across the country, but unfortunately it was struck down by the U.S. District Court in Arizona on August 30, 2021. That court issued a ruling that vacated and remanded the NWPR, essentially repealing it overnight. On a less accelerated timeline, the Biden Administration has announced its intent to carry out a two-step rulemaking process, first repealing the NWPR and then writing a new WOTUS definition.

What is the current definition of WOTUS?

EPA announced its intent to interpret WOTUS consistent with the pre-2015 regulations until further notice. This means that regulatory requirements and jurisdictional determinations will follow limits put in place by the agencies' 1986 regulations and subsequent guidance.

How does WOTUS impact cattle producers?

Cattle producers rely on clean water for the health of their animals, families, and communities. Producers recognize the Clean Water Act as an important tool to protect our nation's water quality, but they also need clear rules to be able to operate their businesses successfully and in compliance with the law. Since the Clean Water Act's passage in 1972, cattle producers and other small business owners have faced years of inconsistent interpretation regarding the reach of federal jurisdiction on WOTUS. Policy changes and litigation led to ever-changing requirements, making it difficult for regulated stakeholders to rely on consistent standards. Further, recent attempts to define WOTUS have gone far beyond previous interpretations, impacting ranchers who have never before been subject to federal regulations.

What is NCBA doing?

NCBA continues to fight against overreaching federal jurisdiction under the Clean Water Act. We are working with the EPA and Congress to ensure that any definition of WOTUS provides necessary clarity for cattle producers and does not exceed the statutory limits of the Clean Water Act. Any definition of WOTUS should satisfy these criteria:

- Ensure that the regulatory definition of WOTUS is consistent with the Clean Water Act and existing Supreme Court precedent.
- · Limit federal jurisdiction to traditionally navigable waters, their consistently flowing tributaries, and abutting wetlands.
- Maintain important agricultural exemptions, including exemptions for stock ponds, agricultural ditches, and prior converted cropland.



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



Blood test – Several tests using progesterone measurements in blood and milk have been developed to confirm pregnancy. The most useful test to date is a blood test developed by University of Idaho DVM Garth Sasser. He discovered a protein produced by the placenta of ruminant animals that is detectable in blood, and founded a company called BioTracking. His blood test called BioPRYN for cattle and other ruminants became commercially available in 2002.

Cows and heifers must be 30 days post-breeding and cows must be 90 days post-calving. Breeders using embryo transfer should check recipient cows at 32 days to give the embryo a couple of extra days to attach. Pregnant cows should be retested between 70 and 80 days to confirm pregnancy as a certain percentage will experience early embryonic death loss.


Disadvantages of the blood test include having to wait for results (which may take 2-3 days) compared to knowing immediately, and an inability to accurately determine the stage of pregnancy. Producers who just work cows one time and split off the open ones to sell won't find it useful, but operators who have access to the cows more than once – as when giving calves preweaning vaccinations – can process the cows after they know which ones are open.

Pregnancy checks can be a useful tool to improve management and increase overall profits for a farm. Having the knowledge of open heifers and cows reduce feeding costs and allow better management decisions.
